

January is National Blood Donor Month

Blood banks begin search for donors

For children, January is a month for sledding and building snowmen. For blood banks it is a time of searching.

With snowstorms, holidays, increased illness and winter vacations, donations to the blood banks come up short every year.

It's one of the reasons that January has been designated National Blood Donor Month. With blood being required by a patient every two seconds and only about 3 percent of the population donating blood, the plea goes out for eligible donors to donate as often as possible.

A single donation of blood can save three lives.

Blood banks want prospective donors to know that donating is a very safe procedure. All materials involved are used only once and then discarded.

The process starts with registration, a health history is taken and a miniphysical is given. The actual donation takes about 10 minutes and equals approximately one pint of blood. Your body will normally replace the lost fluid within 24 hours.

The American Red Cross offers some tips to make donating a good experience.

Before going to donate, eat a good breakfast or lunch. Avoid fatty foods and eat iron-rich foods. Drink extra fluids to replace the fluid you will donate but avoid caffeine.

Be sure to wear clothes with sleeves that can be raised above the elbow.

Afterwards, eat the snack and drink provided.

Over the next 24-48 hours, be sure to drink plenty of fluids.

Even if you cannot donate blood due to health conditions or other reasons, you can still participate in Blood Donor Month. You can help organize a blood drive, or volunteer to help at mobile blood sites.

Check with your local blood drives to see if they need treats to give to donors after they give blood.

Monetary donations are always welcome.

PSSSST...THESE WALLS CAN TALK!!

Howdy folks! My name's Woody! I'm a ceiling beam in the Hermosa Arts and History Association's Museum. I've been around a long time and this is my story...

I started life as a pine cone that blew off a Ponderosa Pine tree and rolled down a hill into some nice soft mud. Pretty soon, the sun came out and warmed me up and lo and behold, I started sprouting! First roots, then branches and before you knew it, I was a sapling! I slept when it turned cold but when the sun and rains came I grew and grew. Soon, I was big enough to spread pine cones of my own.

Birds built nests in my branches and bears scratched their backs on my trunk. Native People sat in my shade seeking visions. They called where I grew "Paha Sapa" which means "hills that are black". I watched people dig up rocks and shake them until they found the yellow rocks that made them whoop and holler! I saw men atop their horses, dressed alike, parade in a line in front of me. Quite a sight!

One day, when I was about 200 years old and grown quite a girth, some men came with big saws and cut me down! They had to work really hard but they got me onto a wagon pulled by horses. It was a bumpy ride but I was finally dropped off at a sawmill. There, they took off my bark and cut me into rectangles and laid me out to dry. I was so big that I made a whole bunch of those rectangles that the men called boards. We all dried straight, strong and true. Now my adventure would really begin!

After I had dried for about a year, a man came to the sawmill and said he needed some really good lumber because they were building a school in Hermosa. It was going to be two stories and had to be the best. He was brought over to the stack where I was drying and he decided that I would be perfect. I became the beams that held up the second floor. I got to have kids walk across my back while I sheltered the ones below. It was an easy job for one as strong and straight as me.

I watched those kids learn and grow for 40 years until one day....and I swear this is the truth....they picked up the whole building and rolled it down the street on LOGS! I hung onto the top floor for all I was worth and we landed on Second Street....all well and good and in one piece!

For the next 70 years, the building became the Masonic Lodge. Once again, I held strong as the Masons and the Eastern Stars walked on my back during their sacred meetings and sheltered the dances and gatherings they sponsored on the first floor. What a time we had! Music, laughter and love seeped into every nook and cranny!

But, alas, after holding together for 110 years, the Masons decided that the old building needed to be torn down. I was really sad but had to admit that I was getting a little tired and parts of me were beginning to sag.


As I was moping one day, I heard voices on the first floor.... "Do you remember all the fun times we had here?" "Boy, it would break my heart to see such a vital part of the community torn down." "I think if we reinforced a few things and gave it a new foundation, it could be used again." "We could turn it into a museum and preserve our history!".....Oh, Wow...there was hope!

And that's what happened. Community members got together and bought the building for \$1.00. Over the next 25 years, a new foundation, roof, bathroom, insulation, stucco, additional support beams (which helped me a bunch), new stairway, interior walls, heating, air conditioning and refinished floors were all added with amazing support from the community and dedicated volunteers. On Mother's Day, May 12, 2024, I watched as the doors opened to the public and the place became alive again! It was so exciting!

You know what? I may be over 300 years old, but I can still hold up the second floor of this building with the help of these younger saplings! The HAHA board decided I was so special that I didn't need to be covered with ceiling tiles so folks could see the type of construction used in 1880s. So come down and see me sometime! I'll be waiting for you!





Another trip around the sun.

Life is a cycle, and within life are multiple cycles. New or birth is followed by growth or maturity, then comple-

tion or finishing makes the end. Renewal or new birth comes next, and the cycle repeats. Here we are at the time that symbolizes fresh beginnings. The notion of renewal, righting wrongs, reestablishing agreements, and committing to better living goes back four thousand years to the Babylonians. They recognized the beginning of a new planting cycle in March. Then, in 46 BC, Julius Caesar tweaked the calendar and established January 1st as the beginning of the calendar year. Eventually, the early Christians made it a tradition to recognize past mistakes and promise to do better in special church services on New Year's Eve. As time passed, this practice has morphed into what we identify as making New Year's Resolutions.

Resolutions harm your mental health.

Research shows six to ten percent of resolutions are kept and completed throughout the year. This makes for a good argument for thinking differently about this risk to one's self-esteem.

Resolution implies certainty, a definite, final, and mechanical action that does not accommodate the unexpected twists and turns of ordinary living. Resolutions cause stress. When "life happens," we can't consistently eliminate an unwanted behavior or adopt a new one. We tell ourselves we are failures, and our self-worth takes a punch. The inner critic takes over; you quit trying and settle with "I can't." Resolutions are firm, strict, and long forgotten before February; don't punish yourself.

Intentions use self-compassion, which is the neuroscience of change.

Setting intentions is a softer experience in achieving the desired outcome. We tend to be less self-critical, more flexible, and broader.

We can forgive ourselves when "life happens," and we are bounced off track. Intention is a practice that requires us to be in the present rather than lingering in the past or obsessing over the future. An intention is something aimed for, something you actively mean to carry out. Intentions are open-ended and allow for nuance when "life happens," we need to adjust our intentions to the new circumstances. Intentions are best set every day for that day. Each day you practice a smaller intention, you will move closer to a more significant intent without placing expectations too high for the future.

Making and keeping a resolution involves only the left brain, which is rational and activity-focused. Our self-critical mind lives here. Resolutions are cerebral. On the other hand, intentions involve the left brain, right brain, heart, and gut instinct. Our self-compassioned mind thrives here. We *embody* our intentions with our whole being. The change we cultivate becomes natural, and our new way of being more genuine.

Cultivate positive mental health and personal growth.

Let the concept of renewal inspire us to make positive changes in our lives, not with resolutions but instead with intentions, giving our mental health a boost, not a bump.



Here are some entertaining items I have gleaned from obituaries this week. A man who "went to be with the Lord Jesus" and will be remembered for his witty personality and "cowboy sense of humor," said that when he fell asleep at night, he dreamed he was "in the chute on a bronc" waiting for the gate to open so he could ride!

Another man had been told by his dad that if he wanted a Harley Davidson, he'd have to work for it; so he did, and on his Harley he rode through the countryside, attending the Sturgis Motorcycle Rally every year.

One couple also were avid volksmarchers and did the 10K hikes in all 48 contiguous states in the U.S. On top of that, they became big fans of bluegrass music and attended festivals across the country. In Marion, S.D., she organized the church's first library.

When he wasn't on his earth-moving machinery, he was busy teaching his daughters his love of hunting and fishing. He also loved to tell stories, one after the other.

She and her husband flew into the primitive areas of Papua New Guinea to support the work of Bible translation there. Cont. pg. 27





She loved baking pies for the local café along with fixing hair and doing needlework. She was loved by the community and loved the community just as much.

She enjoyed volunteering in her children's classrooms and especially loved dressing up as the "Cat in the Hat" and reading to school children.

He was born on the family home on Battle Creek and spent his life in the Black Hills except for one year of school in Brookings, and a year in Missoula, Montana.

She loved baking, canning, and playing cards during family gatherings. She loved her Bronco and spending time with her grandchildren. She enjoyed her morning walks, Bible study, and good coffee.

Born Oct. 6, 1840 in Greene County, Pennsylvania, he died Feb. 17, 1898 in Hermosa, South Dakota. After his service as a corporal in Company D in the First West Virginia Cavalry, he spent his life as a farmer.

Arrow Wound served at Camp Robinson, and enlisted as a scout in Company D under command of Lt. William P. Clark, 2nd U.S. Cavalry, serving two three-month enlistments, December 12, 1876 through July 1, 1877.

He particularly liked providing hunting opportunities to his military and law enforcement friends. If he noticed kids hunting, he'd talk to them, and if he discovered that "ditch" hunting was their only option, he would offer them a one-day hunt on his property, so many kids got their first pheasant for free. After retiring, he helped track down the "gremlins" on the B-1 Bomber; his commitment to his country lasted 43 years, and he retired from Ellsworth Air Force Base.

Justice Department busts major

cybercrime hub

Cybercriminals who visited popeyetools recently to purchase stolen information and other illicit tools found a nasty surprise instead -- the website had been seized by the United States Justice Department. And to really drive the point home, the single splash page also features an image of Popeye behind a set of iron bars.

According to The Record, Popeye Tools has been selling stolen credit card data since at least 2016. Users could also purchase debit card numbers, banking information, and other valuable personal information that could be used to commit identity theft. Stolen access devices and other tools for financial crimes were also available, often at bargain prices.

The sophisticated criminal marketplace fashioned itself as a highquality resource for discerning cyber thief's, and even deployed the phrase "Quality, not quantity" to attract clientele. Popeye Tools even guaranteed its products, promising refunds for stolen credit card data that was not valid at the time it was sold.

The Justice Department identified three men -- two from Pakistan and one from Afghanistan -- as the perpetrators, though it's unclear where the men are currently located or if they have been arrested. All have been

charged with several offenses in U.S. federal court and face up to 10 years in prison if they are convicted. The Justice Department has also seized a cryptocurrency account controlled by one of the suspects, worth approximately \$283,000

Happy New Year (whenever it might be)

The new year begins on January 1 -- or does it?

Let's back up to early spring in 1750, when winter frost and ice were giving way to new growth and longer days across England, Ireland, and the thirteen colonies across the ocean. The King's loyal (and occasionally disloyal) subjects said farewell to the old year on March 24, as they had for many centuries, and greeted the year 1751 at midnight on March 25.

Another year proceeded as normal until early September, when warm days were just starting to give way to cooler evenings. People across the Empire retired to bed on September 2 ... and woke up on September 14, as decreed by the Calendar (New Style) Act, passed in Parliament the year before to align England and her territories with the Gregorian calendar.

The Act also decreed that the new year would begin on January 1 -- supposedly chosen because January got its name from Janus, the Roman god of transitions and beginnings. British subjects barely had time to

shake off the hangover of losing 11 days in September before the year 1751 ended, just nine months after it began.

So if you felt like your 2024 passed way too quickly, remind yourself that at least you got a full 12 months.

Electric trucks experience a global surge

Trucking keeps the world supplied with just about everything it needs or wants, but fluctuating fuel costs create a ripple effect that impacts supply chains and hits consumers right in their wallets.

In order to keep the wheels of commerce turning, governments and the private sector have leaned into electric trucking. According to Strategy&, a third of all trucks in Europe, North America, and Greater China will be battery or fuel cell-powered zero emission vehicles (ZEVs) by 2030. That market share is expected to rise to 70 percent by 2035.

While tightening regulations are partly responsible for the speedy shift toward ZEVs, it's not the whole picture. Newer electric truck technologies are priced more competitively than previous iterations, and experts say that battery electric trucks will come with a lower cost of ownership compared to internal combustion engines. There are fewer moving parts, for example, and less things to break. They tend to be quieter, so better for

residential areas.

However, a number of issues loom large.

For long-distance shipping, nations need a network of charging stations.

A fully-loaded 18-wheeler diesel truck could nearly make the trip from California to New York with one or two stops for fueling. An electric truck, on the other hand, with the best available batteries would need to make 11 or 12 stops for at least 30 minutes, assuming an average battery range of 300 miles.

Bridges and roadway weight limits will have to be examined and upgrades made. While electric vehicles have less vibration and more even weight distribution, they are heavier than diesel trucks. Current weight limits for trucks on interstates is set at about 80,000 pounds. Some states have allowed 2,000 extra pounds for electric trucks, in order to accommodate the extra battery weight.

Much depends on new research into batteries to create lighter, longer-range devices. Among the solutions: Lithium-sulfur, silicon anodes, battery management strategies, and graphene.

Your Al cheat sheet

The technology is evolving so quickly that you're forgiven if you don't remember the finer details of artificial intelligence. But like it or not,

Al's role in our everyday lives is only going to grow, and a basic working understanding will serve you well.

What is AI?

Artificial intelligence, or AI, analyzes and interprets data in order to simulate human intelligence -- meaning the way we gather information and learn from experience, solve problems, make decisions, and adapt to changing circumstances. But unlike humans, traditional AI can't come up with new ideas on its own, and can only make suggestions based on its analysis of existing data.

Is that the same as generative AI?

Not exactly. Generative AI is designed specifically to generate new content -- something that traditional AI isn't programmed to do. Though both systems analyze and interpret data, generative AI identifies patterns in large datasets and then creates new variations based on the information it gleans from the existing dataset. For example, generative AI might train on photos of pickup trucks, and then generate a recognizable image of a pickup truck that does not match any of the photos in the original dataset.

What are they good for?

Traditional AI excels at performing specific tasks with clear and consistent rules, like monitoring your credit card transactions to detect fraudulent activity or segregating

spam emails from your regular inbox. It excels at automating unavoidable and time-consuming chores.

Generative AI outputs new material based on input or parameters from users -- for example, a user might request a haiku about a tree and receive a complete haiku based only on that suggestion. More specific instructions yield more defined outputs.

Does generative AI really "create" new material?

That's a subject of fierce debate, but Uncle Sam doesn't seem to think so. Al-generated content, including text, images, or music, is not eligible for copyright protection. If you want something you can own and legally protect, you'll have to create it the old -fashioned way -- with your human brain.

Schwan song:

Iconic frozen food business closes

After 72 years in business, Schwan's Home Delivery -- also known as Yelloh after a 2022 brand refresh -- has parked its famous yellow trucks for good. In a statement, the company cited "multiple insurmountable business challenges" as the reason for the closure, but some former employees and retail analysts say that Schwan's failed to evolve with the times, and its last-ditch efforts were simply too late.

According to the New York Times,

Schwan's difficulties began in the late 1980s, when fewer people remained at home during the day to accept deliveries and relationships between longtime drivers and customers faded. Competition from membership stores like Costco and Sam's Club further eroded Schwan's market share, and regulatory changes further impacted truck operations.

By the 2010s, the grocery delivery service seemed mostly old-fashioned compared to mobile shopping options at conventional grocery stores and platforms like Instacart.

Schwan finally moved to update its business model in 2018, selling an 80 percent stake to South Korean food company CJ CheilJedang -- a deal that included the entire frozen food business (including well-known brands like Mrs. Smith's, Red Baron, Schwan's, and Frechette), though Schwan's still retained ownership of the delivery business. In 2022, the company rebranded itself as Yelloh, thus distancing itself from a brand with a decades-long heritage. And in early 2024, Schwan broke its last link with history when Yelloh trucks ceased carrying Schwan's brand frozen foods

entirely, including its beloved ice cream

The Schwan's Company, which supplies grocery stores and other food-service outlets, is still in business.

Massive ocean coral discovered

Researchers exploring the Pacific Ocean off the coast of the Solomon Islands have found an extraordinary organism: A massive coral made of 1 billion polyps, tiny individual creatures.

Measuring 100 feet wide and long, the single coral is estimated to be at least 300 years old. It is not a reef, which is a network of many coral colonies. Instead, the newly discovered coral is a single structure that has grown uninterrupted for hundreds of years.

According to National Geographic, the coral is so massive it can be seen from space, but even from the surface it may appear just as a rock. Researchers thought it might be a shipwreck. Even local people did not know the coral was there.

Airport becomes the place to be -- not leave

If you think of airports as the place you have to go before you get to where you want to be, the Singapore Changi Airport might change your mind.

Terminal 1 is home to a seven-story

Rain Vortex, the world's largest indoor waterfall that plunges into a rainforest. If you get bored there, you can climb a rock wall, go to a movie, visit a butterfly garden or swim in a rooftop pool. In Terminal 2, you can enjoy a bar staffed by a robot and a digital sky.

It's the most lavish entry in the class of airports that are becoming a destination themselves.

Here's a refresher course: Driving in snow



Before you start: Clear the snow and ice off your whole car, (not just the windows) so

you have an unobstructed view of the road. Don't forget to clean the head-lights. Carry a cellphone, shovel, sand or kitty litter, snacks and water in case you get stuck.

After a big snow, don't leave until the snow plows and sanding trucks have done their work. For a frozen door lock, heat the end of the key with a match. Turn your lights on when you leave.

- * When renting a car during bad weather, ask for one with four-wheel drive. It won't solve all driving problems, but four-wheel drive can help you get through snow. Drive slowly.
- * If you don't have much experience

driving in winter conditions, practice your moves and check your car's response in a vacant parking lot before starting your trip. Warmer climes, such as in Atlanta, generally have a mix of snow and sleet.

On the road: Drive slowly and leave three times the amount of space you normally allow between your car and the one ahead. Don't use cruise control. To stop, brake gently. If your wheels start to lock up, ease off the brake.

In a skid: If your rear wheels skid, stop accelerating and steer in the direction you want the front wheels to go. Apply anti-lock brakes with steady pressure. If you have standard brakes, pump them gently.

What if you get stuck? It can happen in your yard, in front of a house, or anywhere you happen to slide off the road for even a few feet. When it does, don't spin your wheels.

- * Turn the wheels from side to side to push away the snow. Use a light touch to ease your car out. If that doesn't work, use a shovel to clear the snow from the wheels and underside of the car and put sand under the wheels. Try gently rocking the vehicle back and forth.
- * Don't gun the engine repeatedly, or you could ruin the transmission. If none of this works, dial up a tow truck. Have a snack and a drink of water. Call your boss to say you'll be

late, then just relax and wait for help.

How to save your back and your heart

but still shovel the snow

The white stuff drifting down is beautiful. But you have to get rid of it, and start getting rid of it very soon.

Shoveling snow is a physically demanding job. Check with your doctor to see if you should be doing it at all. If not, or if shoveling is not your thing, prepare ahead by setting up a snow removal service or contracting with a strong neighbor.

- * Before you go out, warm up your muscles and stretch as you would before any exercise. Dress in layers so you can remove one if you get heated up. Extra heat makes the heart beat faster, and you want it to stay at a normal pace. * The best time to work on the snow is when it's still falling. It won't be as deep, and it will be loose, powdery or a lot easier to move. At this point, your leaf blower could do the job.
- * If it's already deep, use a smaller, lighter shovel. Start with small loads.
- * Push the snow rather than lifting it whenever you can, even if it's for a small area. Every push avoids a lift.
- * When you do lift, use your legs instead of your back. Face the direction you want the snow to go and throw it without twisting. * Do larger areas in segments. The National Safety Coun-

cil recommends shoveling a while, then resting.

Keep your feet warm; avoid a cold

A number of studies show that feeling generally cold outside or indoors will not cause a cold. Having cold feet, however,



can make you more likely to get one.

Researchers at Cardiff University's Common Cold Center (Wales, U.K.) say that having very cold feet could jump-start a cold. Cold feet, the doctors explain, cause constriction of the blood vessels in the upper airways, which may reduce your body's defenses against viruses.

It wouldn't hurt to make yourself comfortable and reduce your chance of a cold at the same time.

Put on some thick socks if the floor gets drafty when you watch television, and wear them outside when the weather is frigid.
